The History of Our School

We all know what the school is like now, but what about its past?

The current grey building was finished in 2001. Previously to this, the school was on two sites, one here, known as the upper school, and the other, known as the lower school, was on Westhill Road, where Homelands Primary School is now. Homelands Primary was up here on our current site. The school was called Westlands School from 1973 to 2015. Previously to that, the school on the lower site was called Westhill School and the school that was on the upper site was called Homelands Technical School. The old building (some of which is still here in Science, Art and SEN) is much older than the 1970s. Mr Mould's memories give more information about this.


Miss Cox

1. What can you remember about the old school?

"Well," the first carried on, "It seems a bit strange that this is the same army that caused so much havoc and almost destroyed the world."


"Yer," a third hero joined in. "it does." The fourth interrupts, "Ummm...Where's their leader?"


"Who?" The fifth one looked confused. "You never pay attention do you Sky? You know, the really posh snobby rood guy?"

History in the Spring Term at The Spires College

In history, Year 8 students have been learning about the ways that Torquay was affected in the Second World War. As a department we believe that it is of immense importance that students not only have the opportunity to learn about diverse groups around the world, but the history of their local area. To support this, students learn about how Torquay was impacted by the Blitz and the important role it played in the D-Day Landings at the end of the Second World War. From June 1940 Torbay was under constant threat of air attack, and by the end of May 1944 there had been 642 alerts and 23 raids. Tragically, within half a mile of our College, the church at St Marychurch was bombed during the Blitz, which led to the deaths of 21 teachers and children who were at Sunday School at the time of the bombing raid. Devon played an important role in the preparations for the Normandy Landings as its coastline was similar to the landing beaches of Normandy. Therefore, many local towns were selected as embarkation points for the American forces. Full scale rehearsals for the landings took place at Slapton Sands near Dartmouth. It was selected due to its resemblance to Utah beach. A total of 3,000 people were evacuated from the South Hams, many coming to Torbay. We hope that students appreciate the momentous role their local area played in liberating Europe.

Staff supporting Ukraine

Like many communities, the staff at The Spires College wanted to help the campaign to provide aid to support people caught up in the situation in Ukraine. Across the first week the donations flooded in: clothes, sleeping bags, duvets, toiletries, baby supplies and plenty of pet food. The car was loaded on Thursday with only just room for the driver and the items were delivered to a collection point in Okehampton. Later that night the supplies were on their way to Poland to be distributed by Save the Children Fund to both refugees coming over the border out of Ukraine and into the Ukraine city of Lviv for families sheltering there.

More donations were loaded on Friday, not quite as much as the day before but still a good car load, and delivered to the Church in Winkleigh. These were driven to Exeter for a collection being organised by Oksana Vincent, a Ukrainian living and working in Exeter, whose family are still in Ukraine. This load was on its way to families who had moved from the East of the country, near the Russian border to the Carpathian Mountains.




