Purpose of Funding

The Covid Recovery premium is part of the government's package of funding to support pupils whose education has been impacted by COVID-19.

It is a time-limited grant providing over £300 million of additional funding for state-funded schools in the 2021/22 academic year and £1 billion across the 2022/23 and 2023/24 academic years.

The allocation of this grant is based on the number of students in individual schools and colleges who are eligible for Pupil Premium with, in secondary schools, the school receiving \pounds 276 per eligible pupil. For The Spires College this equates to an expected payment of \pounds 101,085 for the 2022-23 academic year.

Use of Funds

To ensure that recovery premium is focused on effective approaches to raising the educational attainment of pupils, schools must use their recovery premium in line with the 'menu of approaches' set by the Department for Education.

The menu has been developed in line with the Education Endowment Foundation's 3-tiered approach to help schools allocate spending across the following 3 areas:

- supporting high-quality teaching, such as staff professional development
- providing targeted academic support, such as tutoring
- tackling non-academic barriers to academic success, such as difficulties with attendance, behaviour and social and emotional wellbeing
